NEWS FROM WANSFORD PHARMACY

It's June! Sunny days, warm weather and long balmy nights. What we've all been waiting for. And hopefully the whole country will again be enthralled by the men's football team at the Furns

is for - Entertaining. BBQs and picnics in the park are a wonderfully English pastime but with excess weight and obesity at worrying levels these don't come without consequences. Whilst the tablet antihistamines (cetirizine, loratadine, or the more non-drowsy fexofenadine) are instantly recognisable as means to prevent the symptoms of hayfever, you may also need to add a nasal spray and/or eye drops for full effectiveness. It is essential to use these every day to prevent rather than treat symptoms.

O - Ouch! Bites and stings are rife during summer. Preventative measures are a must. Using a spray or a roll-on "DEET"-containing product, and covering exposed areas of the body really helps. If the worst happens, our pharmacy can help treat infected insect bites by issuing antibiotics (where appropriate) without the need to contact your doctor.

S - Sun protection is a must, even when the day is overcast. Use a quality SPF of at least 30, or 50 for those taking medications that cause photosensitivity. Regular applications are necessary for optimal protection.

Why Do You want to Cut the Grass so Short?

In recent years most English gardens have had immaculately cut lawns and flower beds carefully weeded so that there are large areas of soil left bare. Achieving this is very hard work and the result is a sterile monoculture that supports hardly any natural life. A close cropped lawn is needed if you want to play bowls or croquet, but otherwise, what is the point of it? The only things worse are artificial turf and large areas of hard paving.

If you set the mower to leave about 2-3 inches of grass, you will find that very shortly after mowing your lawn will be a mass of daisies, buttercups and other wild flowers. If you want to enhance this, you can always rake the lawn in the early spring and sow wild flower mix into the grass. The longer you avoid close cutting the lawn, the better the display will be. Walking or sitting on the longer grass is a delight.

Once you have some wild flowers in the grass, you will find insects feeding on them. In turn, the wild birds will eat the insects. Grass left slightly long encourages worms, which aerate the soil and also provide food for wild birds.

If you can leave even small areas with long grass and covering vegetation, this will give places for wildlife to shelter and you may gain a population of hedgehogs (very good at eating slugs). A small pond with sloping sides will develop a population of frogs, adding interest to the garden.

Many gardens have fences that extend right down to the ground and carefully built to prevent all movement of wildlife. If you have a dog that is prone to wandering, this is understandable but it cuts your garden off from nature. My garden has deliberately porous fences with two of our neighbours and our properties have become a route for muntjak deer, badgers, foxes and hedgehogs travelling around the village. We find this very interesting and it delights visitors.

So, why shut out nature? A few simple changes to the way you garden can help to halt the alarming decline in England's wildlife and make your garden a much more interesting place. The wise words of Gertrude Jekyll "When planning a garden, one should always set aside at least an acre for trees and wildlife" are difficult to apply in a modern garden but at least we can try to work with nature rather than shutting it out and creating a monoculture.

King Charles has started changing the way that the Buckingham Palace gardens are run, leaving the grass much longer so that nature is encouraged. This works even in the middle of London so we can do it in our little corner of England.

Wansford Parish Council met on the 12th of May for the Annual General Meeting and the regular monthly meeting, and the full details of both meetings will be published in due course both on the website and the notice board outside the church.

Sadly, our dear Chairman John Stannage felt he had to resign due to his current health conditions, but we very much hope he will be well enough to stand again when elections happen next year. As part of the Annual General meeting, Richard Clarke was appointed to be the new Chair with Graham Stevens and myself sharing the role of Vice Chair. Other appointments were made to make it easier for people to find a point of contact amongst the councillors and full details can be found on the website.

It was great to have several members of the public present at May's meeting. A survey was brought forwards about the parking situation in Nene Close which is being given careful consideration, and suggestions for the bus shelter & notice board were also brought forwards.

If you have any pressing concerns or suggestions for the village, please do attend the next parish council meeting on the 10th of June or reach out to the parish clerk, email on the website, or one of the councillors.



By the time you receive a copy of this, I hope the new bus service will have started. We have worked hard behind the scenes to ensure a bus returns to Wansford working in collaboration with the other Parishes involved in the bus campaign. We have negotiated the best times available and had to make compromises with the route to ensure the bus goes to both Stamford & Peterborough via Longthorpe, Castor, Ailsworth, Wansford & Wittering. The timetables should be delivered to every household in the village via Royal mail but if

for any reason you don't receive one, please get in touch and I will do my best to find a copy.

I want to say a personal thank you to all who helped with the village spring clean. So many people went to such a great effort to tidy and clean our village and I know many of you throughout the village are as grateful as I am. If you would like to see this as an annual event and have some suggestions for how it could be better organised and want to get involved, please reach out to me so we can plan a little more ahead next time.

SIBSON-CUM-STIBBINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Sibson-cum-Stibbington held their Annual meeting on the 9th May 2024. All councillors were present together with 6 members of the public.

The Chairman gave the annual report, followed by the election of Officers. Cllr. Beuttell was duly elected as Chairman with Mike Bradshaw elected as Vice Chair. The remaining roles were then allocated. The annual accounts have not been completed and signed off, so will be presented at the next PC meeting.

The Parish Council meeting then followed. There were no apologies, as all Councillors were present.

The Chairman opened the meeting and welcomed everyone. During the Public forum, complaints were again received regarding the parking in the Village outside the Haycock, where visitors to the Haycock Hotel are parking at the front instead of being directed to the substantial car park at the rear. We have requested this before, but we will communicate with the Hotel management in writing. Concerns were also raised regarding the amount of visitors expected for the Haycock Summer Family Fun Fayre to be held on the 8/9th June. The PC have contacted the Haycock regarding this, but so far, they have not engaged with us to give information for contingency plans regarding parking on those days. We understand that HDC have also requested them to engage regarding the arrangements for those days.

The question of speeding in the village was raised, with suggestions of a 20MPH speed limit along Elton Road, or some traffic calming along that stretch of road, and/or narrowing the approach to Wansford Bridge to deter both HGV's and speeding vehicles. Meetings have been held with further meeting scheduled with Wansford PC to discuss.

Payments were, duly authorised. There were no planning applications or correspondence from residents.

It has come to light that the village Allotments have been recently sold to a Private developer. Housing has been suggested, but to date no formal application has been lodged. There are real concerns regarding access to the allotments which would come off the A1 slip road.

Councillor Turner then gave a website address for complaints of illegal parking, potholes, speeding and flooding. https://highwaysreporting.cambridgeshire.gov.uk.

Cllr. Beuttell thanked everyone for their attendance, and announced that the date of the next meeting will be **Thursday 4th July**.

THORNHAUGH PARISH COUNCIL

The Annual Parish Meeting followed by the Annual General Meeting of Thornhaugh Parish Council was held on 7th May 2024 in St Andrew's Church. It was chaired by Chris Smith and present were Yana Clipsham, Louise Molesworth, Camilla Plumb, Nicky Rogers, two members of the public and Deirdre McCumiskey (Clerk).

There were apologies for absence from Gavin Elsey (PCC Ward Councillor).

The following appointments were made:- Chair – Chris Smith, Vice Chair – Louise Molesworth, Thornhaugh & Wansford Parish Burial Ground Committee – Louise Molesworth and Robert Reeve, Augean Community Liaison Committee – Hally Hardie and/or Martin Witherington (TBC), Christie Hall Management Committee – Yana Clipsham and Finance Officer – Nicky Rogers

Police - there were no police representatives present, and nothing formally recorded.

Highways Issues - the Chair said she had no further updates on the A1 layby issues other than that changes are being considered for the 2025 round of budgeting. A47 Dualling – archeological works are nearing completion. The programme of works will be published soon and there will be public information meetings in July 2024, dates to be confirmed).

Social Events – it had been decided that it was not appropriate to ask Peter Sharpley for us of the paddock in Meadow Lane (sheep are currently using it in any case). It was agreed that Nicky Rogers will get together a group of volunteers to brainstorm ideas and to help organise something for September 2024. It was agreed that the Christmas Tree Lights will be switched on 8th December 2024. Joan Bolton-Frost will contact the Wansford Ukelele Band to book them for the event.

Flowers & Tubs at the A1 Entrance to Thornhaugh - the Parish Council is still awaiting a response from Peterborough City Council regarding its request to put planters at the entrance. The Chair has established that the likely cost will be £300 for two planters. It was agreed to purchase some bulbs to plant along the verges in October ready for next year.

Annual Return for Year Ending 31st March 2024 – thanks are expressed to Karen Jones for carrying out the Internal Audit and it was agreed to increase her Audit Fee. The End-of-Year Accounts will be put onto the Website. Section 1 Statement of Accounts, Section 2 Annual Governance Statement and Section 4 Internal Audit & Report were approved and signed by the Chair. The Parish Councillors had reviewed the Clerk's salary, and she was given written confirmation of the increase that they had agreed upon. The Clerk will liaise with Nicky Rogers relating to internet access to the bank account.

Bill's Bench needs repairing. Louise Molesworth agreed to send some photographs of the bench to the Clerk to enable a quote to be obtained for the repair work. Chris will ask Penny Lewin-Watts where the benches were purchased from.

Thanks were expressed to Liam Higgins for cleaning the Lectern and for cutting the grass on the triangle.

Louise Molesworth gave an update of the issues discussed at the recent Thornhaugh & Wansford Parish Councils' Burial Ground Committee, including the purchase of a flagpole which will be sited in the burial ground.

Louise Molesworth had spoken to Sarah-Jane, her colleague at Wansford Surgery, and it was agreed that she will provide Defibrillator update training for small groups. Louise to get content of sessions so that she can establish interest from residents.

Martin Witherington has confirmed that the noticeboard at Home Farm is in storage and will be re-erected once the landscaping is established. The noticeboard may need some refurbishment.

Camilla Plumb confirmed that she would be leaving the village sometime in August, although not planning to sell their home immediately. This will be discussed further at the next meeting to establish whether she will remain on the Parish Council since her absence will likely be for a year. As a homeowner in the village, she continues to meet the criteria for being a Councillor and under the regulations may continue on the Parish Council, attending meetings via video link. 
